Our Trinity Garden is a member of MUG

Did you know that we are part of a local nonprofit network of community gardeners in Mobile and the surrounding area? Our garden is one of five church gardens among the 24 gardens listed as Mobile Urban Growers (MUG).

The mission of MUG is to assist the 25% of Mobilians who do not have access to fresh fruit and vegetables. "MUG combats this hardship by providing tools and support for local gardeners and by making fresh produce available and free for the community at large."

The fresh produce from our garden is shared with our friends in need through our Food Pantry. We recently pulled tons of turnips and greens for the Food Pantry.

Rogation Sunday is May 9

The Sixth Sunday of Easter Season, the fifth Sunday *after* Easter Sunday, is traditionally known as Rogation Sunday. The Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of the following week are known as the Rogation Days, days for fasting and prayer. The Thursday of that week is the Feast of the Ascension, which comes on a Thursday, the 40th day after Easter, when Easter Sunday is counted as the 1st day. Got all that?!

Rogare in Latin means 'to ask.' Rogationtide is a festival primarily focusing on the planting season when we ask God's blessing for an abundant harvest. This year we will mark the Rogation days with a Rogation procession around the boundaries of our parish as we pray the Great Litany.

This will be a great opportunity to be together to celebrate as a parish in our wide-open space and to invite our neighbors from the community to join us. With the Trinity Garden as the center jewel, our Meadow continues to take shape as an inviting space for all.

David Blaize is soon finishing up his Eagle Scout project, which is to enhance our garden with a fence and entrance. To ask God's blessing on the garden and the surrounding area will be a part of Rogation Procession.

The Finance Committee met several times to prepare the 2021 Budget for Trinity Church. At the March Vestry meeting we presented and discussed the proposed Budget, which was unanimously approved. Although the Budget does show a deficit of \$20,000, we feel confident that we will be able to more than cover our expenses this year. Pledge commitments for 2021 are not quite as high as the year before due in part to the Covid crisis. Gratefully we continue to receive pledge commitments, some as recent as late March.

The Committee has streamlined financial statements and our fiscal structure. We continue to explore and discuss innovative ways to generate revenue to support our ministries, such as grants and the new Friends of Trinity campaign.

Lately we have discussed the need to address our many deferred capital maintenance and repairs. Through Operation Reclamation, we are hoping to raise 100K to help pay for the replacement of the Parish House windows, repair the HVAC system, and ground our lightning protection system. Cash flow through this portion of the current calendar year has been steady and strong. We are in a good position as to cash flow at this point in time, and the Committee will continue to monitor our monies and report to the Vestry accordingly.
