

We look forward to learning more about you, and sharing about our past, present, and hopes for the future!






PARISH HISTORY

Founded in 1845, Trinity was the second Episcopal church to be established in Mobile. Started as a free pew church that was open to all, the congregation worshipped for eight years in rented space until the Gothic Revival style church was erected at the corner of Jackson and St. Anthony Streets in downtown Mobile.



Since that time, Trinity has been impacted by two maior natural disasters-Hurricane Fredric in 1979 and the Christmas night tornado in 2012—and of course by the COVID-19 pandemic. Through faith and resilience, we emerge from each challenge stronger and more deeply rooted in the power of community.

In 1929, following the westward growth of the city, the parish prayerfully determined to relocate to its current address at 1900 Dauphin Street. Worship took place in what was known as the Trinity Junior Parish House until 1945, when the downtown church building was moved brick by brick and rebuilt in precise and loving detail at its present location.

Buildings and Grounds

Trinity boasts a beautiful and historic Gothic Revival style sanctuary and a large two-story parish house. Irving Hall serves as a large meeting and dining area for parish functions. With an elevated stage at the north end of the hall, we can host plays, pageants and concerts.











On the east side of the property is "The Meadow," where all are welcome to walk the labyrinth and explore our community garden.

Trinity's Memory Garden

Between the church and the parish building, the Memory Garden is a place for quiet meditation and the final resting place for the ashes of many parishioners and friends of Trinity.



Worship

Worship is the heart of our life together as Episcopalians and exploring the richness and depth of our liturgy is something that the members of Trinity hold very dear.



Holy Eucharist is celebrated at our Sunday and Wednesday services and Compline is offered on Tuesday evenings in Schroeter Chapel. Rite I and Rite II are both used on a rotating schedule for our Sunday services.







A faithful group of lay eucharistic ministers, lectors, ushers, acolytes, Altar Guild, Flower Guild and greeters assist at all Sunday and special services. Our children typically worship with us for all of the service or for the Holy Eucharist portion. A nursery for our children is offered from birth to age five during both worship and Sunday School.

In July of 2022, Trinity hosted a special community service of Evening Prayer for the unity of our Church and in our culture and the world around us. As part of this service, attendees were invited to light a prayer candle in our Lady Chapel. The response to this small offering was so overwhelmingly beautiful that it has become an important part of our Sunday service.

The staff at Trinity consists of a full-time parish administrator and part-time parish steward, finance administrator, and organist. A parishioner provides lawn care services to keep the grounds, including the Labyrinth, well-kept and inviting. During the week, volunteer Office Angels assist in the parish office.

While many of our parishioners have worshiped at Trinity for decades, a focus on digital outreach helped us see growth during the pandemic. Our congregation is comprised of families who live within walking distance from the church, those who travel from different cities entirely, and everything in between.



Finances

Trinity's pledge history appears below. While the number of pledges has fluctuated over the past five years, the average pledge per household has increased over that same period by almost 20%. Service and Outreach



Trinity has long sought to serve our community and our fellow parishioners by:

- Weekly delivery of altar flowers to parishioners.

Service and Outreach

Most Mondays of the year, Trinity opens its doors to provide groceries to our neighbors experiencing food insecurity. Donations from the parish and volunteers keep the food pantry stocked and open. Simple staple foods and seasonal produce grown in the community garden are offered.

Parish Life and Ministries



Fellowship has long been an important aspect of Christian life at Trinity. In the past, a lay-led parish life council organized and coordinated opportunities for deeper community, such as supper clubs, sharing faith dinners, various small group activities, book clubs, and larger parish celebrations such as a parish picnic at Camp Beckwith.











Like many churches, the pandemic affected the momentum of many of our regular programming. While we have worked diligently to get back to spending more time together outside of worship, we look forward to rebuilding a robust set of programs to create more opportunities for people to form meaningful relationships given the pace and schedule of busy lives and families.

Christian Formation

Trinity offers Christian formation for all ages on Sunday mornings. Adult formation classes are layled and discussion based. Godly Play, a Montessoribased method for children's Christian education, is offered during the worship service for children in Pre-K through 4th grade.

An Inquirers Class is offered once a year for all who are interested in receiving confirmation and opportunities for intergenerational learning are sprinkled throughout the liturgical seasons.











Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast



The Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, though officially formed in 1970, traces its origins to an Episcopal presence of over 175 years. The Diocese was constituted from the southern portion of the Diocese of Alabama and the western portion of the Diocese of Florida.

Our Diocese is comprised of 60 worshiping communities stretching from south Alabama to northwest Florida. Our largest population centers are Mobile and Pensacola but this diverse region also includes the farms and forests of the interior counties, and the beaches along the coast. Our Mobile Community


